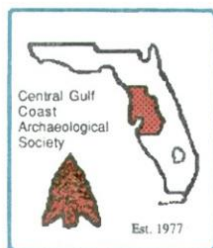

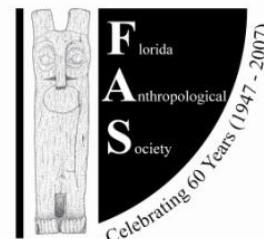

Mound House Exhibits Archaeology: The Anatomy of a Shell Mound

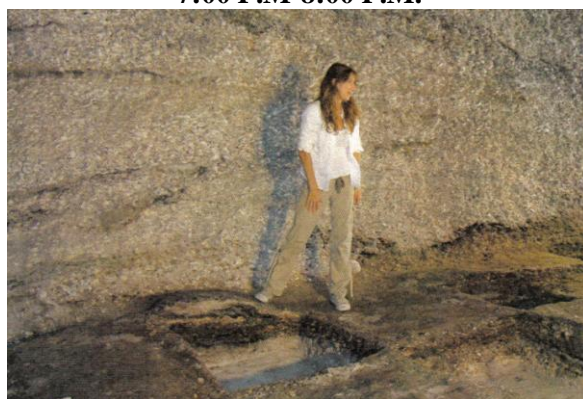

The Mound House is a cultural and environmental learning center situated on a Calusa shell mound on Fort Myers Beach, Florida. Construction of a swimming pool into the mound in 1958 provided the opportunity to develop an archaeological exhibit revealing a vertically complete cross-section of the mound extending over 60 horizontal feet. This talk will summarize the archaeological methodologies employed and results of investigations that yield significant insights into mound construction techniques and use. Data from a number of excavations in southwest Florida reveal spatial and temporal patterns evident of increasing social hierarchy through time. The exhibit within the mound is anticipated to open in October of 2008.

Theresa Schober has conducted archaeological research in southwest Florida for the past nine years and is currently the Director of the Mound House - a three-acre archaeological and historical site on Fort Myers Beach.

Bayshore Homes Project

We have finished excavating Test Unit 3. We extended the unit by excavating another 1X2 unit to the south. We had uncovered a possible pit or low area filled with midden material and hoped to determine the areal extent of this feature. On the last day of testing the discovery of a 1930's era bottle seems to indicate that we had found an old looter's pit. However, further work is still to be done. A column sample was taken on the south wall of the first 1X2 and it will be analyzed in coming weeks.

On Saturday September 22nd, reporter Steve Kornacki with the Tampa Tribune and photographer Greg Fight visited the site. Their article appeared in the Sunday edition of the Tribune the next day. CGCAS and the Bayshore Homes project got important publicity from this article while informing the reader about our group and the area's history.

The last test unit of this project will be started in early November. At that time, the crew may be split again with some working in the lab at Weedon Island on the column sample while others will be in the field.

Since there will be sorting to be done from Column Sample 3 and work to be done on TU 4, there is still time to join us in this exciting and important project.
