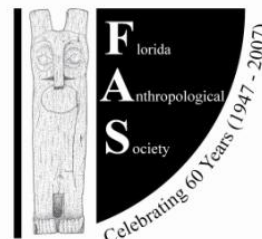

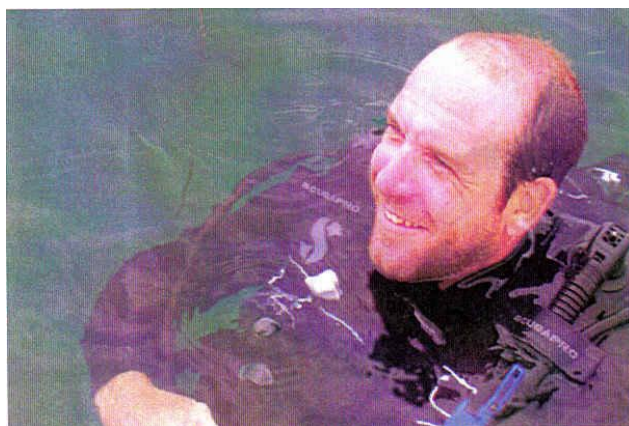
February Meeting

“Underwater Archaeology: A Study of Historic Watercraft”

Jeff Moates, Curator of the Florida Maritime Museum, presents an underwater archaeology project along the Wacissa River in Jefferson County, Florida, where historic watercraft remains were investigated. Interesting construction details of the “flatbottom vessel” relate to similar types recorded in association with plantations along the Georgia and South Carolina coasts. In addition, Moates introduces the work of the Florida Maritime Museum located in the community of Cortez, which was established as a commercial fishing village in 1887. 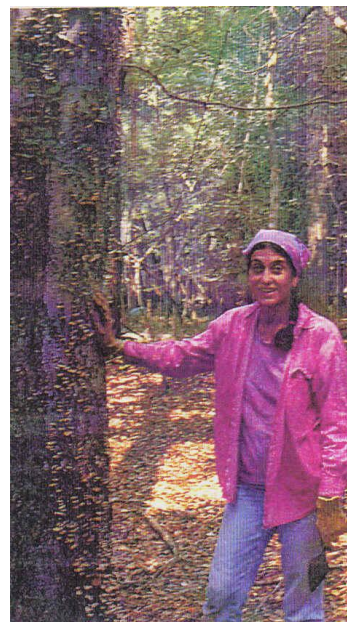
Deadline Reminders

Adventures in Northwest Florida Jungle Archaeology

The University of South Florida's long-term archaeological research in northwest Florida concentrates on the Apalachicola-lower Chattahoochee River Valley and the St. Joseph Bay region, and encompasses 12,000 years of human cultures, from Paleo-Indian to early 20th-century.

Whether doing survey or test excavation in the remote swamp or along stream banks and coast, fieldwork in this region

always includes high adventure, a rich archaeological record, and lots of public archaeology. This talk includes a description of submerged Late Archaic shell middens, earthen mounds, and lost Civil War forts.

The 2008 Topper Site Expedition

Dr. Al Goodyear gave an interesting presentation at Weedon Island on January on recent discoveries and controversies in North American paleoamerican research: pre-Clovis, late Clovis and comet impacts.

He is planning to go back to the Topper site in 2008 for five weeks from May 5th - June 7th. A significant Clovis horizon was identified and excavated in the 2003 - 2007 field seasons. In 2008, the Expedition will continue exploring the Clovis and pre-Clovis occupations at Topper. The 2008 Expedition will concentrate on the Clovis occupation on the hillside. The pre-Clovis excavation will focus on the deeper Pleistocene terrace deposits down to the 50,000 year level.

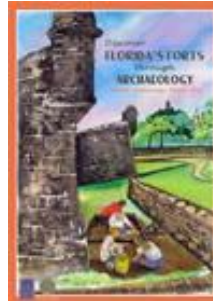
Sacred Lands Fund Raiser

Archaeology Month 2008

Florida's diverse history and prehistory stretches back over 12,000 years. Each year in March, statewide programs and events celebrating Florida Archaeology Month are designed to encourage Floridians and visitors to learn more about the archaeology and history of the state, and to preserve these important parts of Florida's rich cultural heritage. Plan to attend one of the many events throughout Florida during March 2008.



Florida Archaeology Month 2008 focuses on the significance of fortifications and defensive structures in Florida. Some Native Americans put up defensive wall around their villages for protection from other tribes. When Europeans first arrived in Florida, most of the forts were erected out of earth or wood - plentiful materials at hand for quick construction and defense. Later fortifications would be built out of more permanent material like stone, brick, or concrete. They were constructed to protect harbors, rivers, strategic locations, or centers of population. Many towns in Florida got their name from forts and numerous forts are still in existence today.

On March 8, 2008, CGCAS will take part in the Archeology Month Event at Weedon Island. At this event you will learn about the latest archaeological research at Weedon Island Preserve and the Tampa Bay area and enjoy Native American craft demonstrations and the new exhibit gallery depicting prehistoric life on Tampa Bay. Atlatl spear-throwing and hands-on craft activities for youngsters of all ages will be held throughout the day.
